2010 Highlights

- In 2010, the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program completed its ninth consecutive year of operations.
- Four interns participated this year. Since its inception and including this year's interns, the Program's alumni now consist of 38 interns who have been mentored by 46 current and former members of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan. - The Co-operators Group increased its amount of funding to financial-partner status, from its previous level as a corporate sponsor.
- Rawlco Radio's commitment to provide funding for two First Nations or Métis university students to serve as Rawlco Aboriginal Saskatchewan Legislative Interns has been completed.
- The comparative study tour was undertaken in two components – Toronto and Ottawa from February 25 to March 5, 2010 and New York (New York), Washington (District of Columbia), and Richmond (Virginia), as well as sight-seeing side-trips to Philadelphia (Pennsylvania) and Dover (Delaware), from June 1-6, 2010.
- The Saskatchewan Legislative Interns had an opportunity to meet with interns participating in the Manitoba Legislative Internship Program, the Ontario Legislative Internship Program, the Parliamentary Internship Program, and the Virginia Commonwealth University Legislative Internship Program.
- The University of Saskatchewan revised the academic designation of the internship from a 300-level to a 400-level course. As a result, both the University of Saskatchewan and the University of Regina have comparable designations for the university courses associated with the Program.

Overview of the Program

The Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program (SLIP) provides four senior university students or recent graduates with an opportunity to experience the day-to-day operations of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan. Interns are paired with elected members of the Assembly who serve as mentors and provide a practical perspective on the role and work of MLAs. During their seven-month internship, participants are assigned for approximately three months with an MLA from the government caucus and for another similar period with an MLA from the opposition caucus.

In addition to the practical experience provided through the MLA mentors, the Program contains significant academic components. The interns receive six academic course-credits at either the University of Saskatchewan or the University of Regina. These credits are determined through evaluations of the interns' participation during the Program and through the preparation of an

individual research paper and group reports on assigned projects and travel experiences. One of the travel experiences involves visiting parliaments and legislative assemblies in other jurisdictions in order to allow for comparisons with their internship experiences in Saskatchewan.

2010 Interns and Mentors

Our 2010 Saskatchewan Legislative Interns

Interns are chosen by a seven-person selection committee from applications received each year. For 2010, this committee selected the following four Saskatchewan Legislative Interns:

- Craig Fink from Regina has a Bachelor of Arts degree (double major in English and Political Studies) with Great Distinction from the University of Regina.
- Sheena Gordon from Regina has a Bachelor of Arts degree (major in Geography) with High Honours from the University of Regina.
- Elise Lonie from Strasbourg is pursuing a Bachelor of Arts degree with a double honours major in political science and history at the University of Regina.
- Michael Selnes from Melfort has a Bachelor of Arts degree (double major in history and the German language) with distinction from the University of Calgary.

Biographies for each intern appear in Appendix A of this report.

Our 2010 Legislative Mentors

Four members of the government caucus and four members of the opposition caucus within the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan volunteered to serve as mentors to the 2010 interns. The MLAs were assigned to the interns as follows:

Two MLAs – Tim McMillan and Randy Weekes – served as mentors to Saskatchewan Legislative Interns for the first time this year. Taking into account their participation in previous years, Greg Ottenbreit mentored his second intern; David Forbes, his third; Judy Junor and Warren McCall, their fourth; and Glen Hart mentored his fifth intern in 2010. Sandra Morin volunteered as a mentor for her sixth intern this year and currently holds the distinction of mentoring the largest number of interns since the inception of the Program.

We would like to thank the MLAs who served as mentors during the 2010 Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program. They and their staff are an integral part of the Program which would not exist without their support.

2010 Program

Orientation Component

The Office of the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly organized orientation meetings for the interns, most of which took place during the first two weeks of the internship. The orientation component of the Program included meetings with His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, Mr. Speaker, staff and officers of the Legislative Assembly, representatives of government and opposition caucuses, and representatives of the news media and of central agencies in executive government. A list of the people who met with the interns is provided in Appendix C.

Core Component

The interns began their assignments with four members of the Legislative Assembly (two from the government caucus and two from the opposition caucus) on January 25, 2010. These assignments continued until April 16, 2010. The interns were then reassigned to another four members from the other side of the House (two from the government caucus and two from the opposition caucus). The second term assignments concluded on July 3, 2010.

“[The staff in MLA Sandra Morin’s constituency office] included me in almost everything that was being done in the office. In addition to working on some research files, I was given a couple of case files to work on and got to sit in on meetings with constituents who stopped by the office. The case work was fascinating, because I got to sit in on meetings with constituents, learn about their challenges and see what I could do to help rectify the situation. I could see how if certain people couldn’t get an answer to a question, or felt as though they were treated unfairly, a quick call to a government department from an MLA’s office would get the answer quite quickly. You could tell that government bureaucrats did not want to deal with an angry MLA and usually did everything they could to rectify a situation as quickly as possible.”

During their assignment to private members, the interns were given opportunities to accompany their assigned members to meetings, conferences, and consultations. The interns also visited constituency offices and experienced the work that MLAs do to address the concerns and interests of their constituents. This list does not include all of the interns' mentorship experiences with their MLAs. However, it illustrates the range of activities, events, and meetings that occurred as part of the core component of the Program.

Academic Component

The Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program provides interns with six academic credits towards an undergraduate degree, through its recognition as a course at the University of Saskatchewan (Political Studies 382.6) and the University of Regina (Political Science 480). Interns are required to register in one of these courses in order to participate in the Program. In addition to the course credits, enrolment in these courses provides each intern with student benefits, such as liability insurance, Workers' Compensation coverage, and health benefits.

At the end of the internship, each intern received a grade which recognized his or her participation in the program. Each intern's final grade was determined by the director, based on the following weighting:

Beginning with the 2011 internship, the University of Saskatchewan has revised the academic designation of the internship from a 300-level to a 400-level course. SLIP interns from this University will be enrolled in Political Studies 482.6. As a result, both the University of Saskatchewan and the University of Regina will now have comparable designations for the university courses associated with the Program.

Intern Development Component

The intern development component is undertaken through a special fund (“intern development fund”), which is supported by university, corporate, and organizational sponsors, as well as donations from individuals. The fund is administratively managed by the University of Saskatchewan.

In-Province Experiences

The intern development fund is used to support special projects that are identified by the interns to enhance their experience in the Program. These projects include transportation and accommodation costs related to the interns’ travel to other jurisdictions, as well as attendance at workshops, conferences, meetings, and consultations with major organizations and with people in leadership positions from various sectors of Saskatchewan. The interns are responsible for all of the logistical arrangements associated with these projects.

The interns met with officials involved with the Station 20 West project in Saskatoon, the All Nations Healing Hospital in Fort Qu'Appelle, and the Regina Anti-Poverty Ministry. They also spent a day with Chief Perry Bellegarde and the council of the Little Black Bear First Nation.

One of the interns, Craig Fink, was able to tour Areva Resources Canada Inc.'s uranium operations at McArthur River and McClean Lake. Mr. Fink was invited to participate as part of a tour arranged and financed by the company for Members of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan.

The interns have filed a report on their attendance at various conventions and events, as well as their meetings with several leaders.

"Our visit to family court stands out Watching the witnesses speak was especially powerful: mothers and fathers facing addictions, housing, and domestic violence issues giving testimony; and grandparents, aunts, and uncles hoping to take on the role of persons of sufficient interest (PSIs) when the children's parents cannot. Being in court showed another aspect of how the system works and does not work."

Out-of-Province Experiences

An important element of the Program's intern development component is the comparative study tour which involves the interns' travel to other jurisdictions. The purpose of this tour is to allow the interns to compare legislative and government processes against those which they have observed and experienced in Saskatchewan. The tour is organized by the interns and is funded through the intern development fund and through additional fund-raising undertaken by them.

In 2010, the interns' comparative study tour was divided into separate Canadian and international trips. The Canadian trip occurred from February 25 to March 5, 2010, and involved meetings in Toronto and Ottawa. The international trip occurred in the United States from June 1 to June 16, 2010 and involved stops in New York (New York), Washington (District of Columbia), and Richmond (Virginia), as well as sight-seeing side-trips to Philadelphia (Pennsylvania) and Dover (Delaware). The interns have filed a report on their tours, which can be accessed through the Program's website or by contacting the Office of the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan. A list of meetings and events attended by the interns during their tour is provided in Appendix D.

"It was fantastic for us to be inside [New York] City Hall and were treated very well. They spent several hours with us and gave us a private tour. We even got to see Mayor Bloomberg's office. He has converted several rooms into an open office space, where all of his staff works together in an energized team-oriented space with no separate offices. The Mayor has a small desk in a cubicle with low walls, just like everyone else."

2010 Interns' Joint Comparative Study Tour Report

During the two comparative study tours, the 2010 Saskatchewan Legislative Interns had opportunities to meet with interns participating in other internship programs. In Toronto, they met interns in the Ontario Legislative Internship Program. In Ottawa, they met with interns in the Parliamentary Internship Program and with the Manitoba Legislative Internship Program. In the United States, they met with interns participating in the Virginia Commonwealth University Legislative

Internship Program, as well as summer interns serving in the office of United States Senator Kent Conrad.

Community-Services Component

Each year, the Saskatchewan Legislative Interns are required to participate in a community-based activity in a volunteer capacity. In addition to providing personal support, the interns have an opportunity to learn about the objectives, structure, administration, challenges, and successes associated with a community event or organization.

This year, the interns completed their community-service requirement through two organizations. First, they volunteered a day of service to the Lumsden Heritage Home. They chose to visit this facility after hearing, during their attendance at the Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities' convention, about the challenges faced by personal-care homes located in rural communities. The level 3 and 4 personal-care home in Lumsden offered the interns an opportunity to assist various employees who worked with the residents and to meet with administrators and other staff who provided their perspectives on addressing the needs of the elderly in Saskatchewan.

"In politics, it is easy to think of social programs and volunteer organizations merely as numbers without reflecting on the human element that truly drives the organization. By going to the Lumsden Heritage Home and the Regina Food Bank, we were able to witness the profound impact in our communities that these organizations play, and better understand how they operate."

The interns volunteered a second day of community-service at the Regina Food Bank. This was a hands-on experience and involved sorting food and observing how this organization ensures that the people it serves are treated respectfully. The experience provided the interns with a greater appreciation of the extent to which the services provided by food banks are required in our province and the range of people to whom these services are provided.

Administrative Component

The interns perform various administrative duties pertaining to the operation of the Program. These duties vary from year to year depending on the Program's administrative requirements which cannot be otherwise provided through its existing support.

While individual interns assumed lead responsibility for managing a specific administrative duty, all interns were expected to assist their colleagues to ensure that the activities associated with these duties contributed to the Program’s overall success.

2010 Special Events

SLIP-MLA Barbecue

Each year since 2007, the Saskatchewan Legislative Interns have organized a SLIP-MLA steak night event which provides an opportunity for Members of the Legislative Assembly to have an informal supper with current and former interns and other supporters of the Program. The net proceeds from this event are used by the interns to enhance their experience during their comparative study tour. The money can be used to finance entry to museums, side-tours to significant points of interest, or attendance at cultural or sporting events occurring at the time of the tour.

This year, organizing a steak night at a location other than the Legislative Building and that would accommodate the MLAs’ schedule proved to be a challenge. Therefore, the 2010 interns decided to take a different approach to the annual SLIP fundraiser and instead, to organize a barbecue with the food-service provided in the Legislative Building’s cafeteria.

The event was held on April 26, 2010. Hamburgers were barbecued on a grill located outside, near the southwest entrance to the Building. Unlike previous years where a restaurant managed the food-preparation and service functions, the Interns performed all the duties themselves.

Approximately 90 tickets were sold. After expenses, the event generated net proceeds of \$1,139.34.

Many lessons were learned by the 2010 Interns about the time, effort, expectations, and risks involved in organizing such an event. These lessons have been documented in an administrative report for consideration by future SLIP interns when determining how they will organize this fundraising event next year and thereafter.

The interns used these proceeds to pay for a tour of the United Nations Building, attend Broadway performances, and take in a baseball game in Yankee Stadium in New York City. The net proceeds were also used to purchase tickets to museums and aquariums and to visit a state park in Delaware.

Reception and Banquet at the Annual Meeting of the Cooperators



The Cooperators Group has been a financial supporter of the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program since its inception. This year, its funding support to the Program was increased and it is now recognized as a “financial partner”.

On April 14, 2010, The Cooperators Group invited the SLIP interns and administrative officials to attend the reception and banquet held in conjunction with the cooperative’s annual meeting in Regina. The interns had an opportunity to meet Mr. Richard Lemoing, chair of its board of directors; Ms. Kathy Bardswick, its president and chief executive officer; and Mr. Frank Bomben, its director of public affairs and government relations.

During the banquet, the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program was publicly recognized. We also appreciated to hear directly from its senior officials that The Cooperators Group strongly supports the mandate and operations of the Program.

Wind-up and Appreciation Social Event

At the end of each internship, the Saskatchewan Legislative Interns host a reception to extend their thanks and appreciation to the officials, friends, and family members who contributed to their internship experience. Former interns are invited to attend.

This year, the interns’ wind-up and appreciation social was held on July 21, 2010, at the La Bodega Restaurant in Regina. During this event, each 2010 Saskatchewan Legislative Intern was presented with a certificate, signed by Mr. Speaker and the SLIP director, which acknowledged their participation in the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program.

Alumni Support and Engagement

Former interns (“alumni”) are invited to all public events sponsored by the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program. They participate annually in a luncheon event with the current interns, as part of the orientation component of the Program.

This year, former SLIP interns Fabian Contreras (2004 Intern), Justin Leifso (2006 Intern), Michel Carpentier (2006 Intern), and Patrick Button (2008 Intern) met with the 2010 interns and provided perspectives, based on their experience, on how best to use the opportunities provided by the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program.

Former Rawlco Aboriginal Saskatchewan Legislative Intern Jarita Greyeyes (2007 Intern) arranged for this year's interns to attend a pow wow at the Muskeg Lake First Nation. Former SLIP intern Rhiannon Stromberg (2005 Intern) assisted with arranging the portions of the interns' tours at offices of the Organization of American States and at the International Monetary Fund in Washington, D.C.

An alumni newsletter, known as the *Alumni Report*, is published by the Program and is distributed to all former interns. It is also posted on SLIP's website. The 2010 edition of the *Alumni Report* was published in November 2010.

The purpose of the newsletter is to provide an on-going link between former interns and the Program. Alumni are profiled in the newsletter. Through their accomplishments, we are able to promote the career-development potential of the Program to students and potential sponsors.

The Co-operators Group moved from the corporate-sponsorship category to being a financial partner in 2010. This co-operative organization has provided funding for the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program in every year since the Program's inception in 2002. In 2010, the Co-operators Group increased its annual grant to SLIP from \$3,000 to \$4,500. It is currently the largest non-government and non-university financial supporter of the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program.

Core Program

The Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan provides funding for scholarships for four Saskatchewan Legislative Interns (\$14,000 each in 2010), for all expenses incurred by these interns during their mentorship with private members of the Assembly, and for the honorarium and expenses of the Program's director.

Intern Development

Most of the funding for the intern-development component of the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program is generated through initiatives and requests undertaken by the Program's director and other supporters. Another source of intern-development funding is obtained through direct application by the interns to financial programs that support student travel experiences, such as those offered by the Program.

2009-10 Financial Statements

The Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program's statement of revenues and expenses for the period from October 1, 2009 to September 30, 2010, inclusive, has been provided in Appendix B of this report. The Program's finances are administered through four funds. The core program is funded by the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan. The funding received from financial partners, corporate sponsors, and donors for the intern development fund and the Rawlco Aboriginal internship fund is administered by the University of Saskatchewan. A credit union account has been established to manage the interns' fund-raising activities.

During 2009-10, the four funds realized revenues of \$85,422 and expenses of \$100,453, for an overall deficit of \$15,031. The deficit is attributed to the repayment of previous years' unallocated funding to Rawlco Radio. The Rawlco Aboriginal Saskatchewan Legislative

Internship component of the Program was completed in 2009, leaving an unallocated amount of \$15,813.82. The unallocated funding was largely due to a Ralwco intern not completing the 2009 internship. Adjusting for the repayment of this unallocated funding, the Program ended the 2009-10 fiscal year with a \$783 surplus.

The balance sheet for the intern development fund, the Ralwco Aboriginal internship fund, and the interns' fund-raising account has also been provided in Appendix B. The core component of the Program is fully funded by the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan and as such, ends each year without a surplus or a deficit.

The intern development fund has been in existence since the Program began and had an accumulated surplus of \$12,681 as at September 30, 2010. With the completion of this portion of the Program and following the repayment of unallocated funding, the Ralwco Aboriginal Internship Fund ended 2009-10 with a nil balance. The interns' fund-raising account ended the year with cash of \$39 and a credit-union membership share of \$5.00. The combined accumulated surplus for all funds was \$12,735 on September 30, 2010; this compares with \$27,766 on September 30, 2009.

Governance

Memorandum of Agreement

The Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program exists through a memorandum of agreement between the University of Saskatchewan and the University of Regina. The memorandum, signed in 2007, formalizes the universities' support for, and participation in, the Program. The agreement articulates the role of the director and the SLIP Advisory Committee, the academic credits provided by both universities to the Program's interns, the provision of liability insurance coverage to the interns, and the administration of the Intern Development Fund.

Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program Advisory Committee

The program's advisory committee provides governance for managing the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program. The committee consists of the following individual:

- The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan
- One representative from the University of Saskatchewan
- One representative from the University of Regina
- One representative from each of the Government and Opposition caucuses
- The Clerk of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan
- The Director of the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program

The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly serves as the chair of the committee.

The committee did not meet during the 2009-10 fiscal year.

Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program Selection Committee

Applications for the internships are accepted from university students and recent graduates who identify Saskatchewan as their permanent residence. Each year, the current interns take a lead responsibility for promoting the Program to students.

For the 2010 Program, the 2009 interns promoted the program through short-presentations to selected 200 and 300 level classes at the University of Regina and the University of Saskatchewan., as well as offering an information table in the Arts Tunnel at the University of Saskatchewan and the career fair at the University of Regina. There were also attempts made, through the Aboriginal Student Centre and the Aboriginal Public Administration Program at the University of Saskatchewan, to attract applications from First Nations and Métis students.

All SLIP applications are reviewed by the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program's Selection Committee which creates a short-list of applicants who will be considered for the Program, conducts interviews of the short-listed applicants, and makes the decisions on the applicants who will be offered internship positions. The decisions of this Committee are final and are not subject to review or reconsideration by funders, sponsors, elected members of the Legislative Assembly or any other body or program or other elected or appointed bodies who participate with the Program.

The members of the Selection Committee are nominated by various university, administrative, and caucus bodies associated with the program. Upon selection to the committee, the members are not accountable to these bodies, but rather to the Program and to ensuring that the best possible applicants are offered internship positions.

The SLIP Director served as the chair of this committee.

For the 2010 internship program, the Committee considered 22 applications. Of these applications, seven were from students or recent graduates of the University of Saskatchewan, fourteen from the University of Regina, and one from the First Nations University of Canada.

Officers and Staff

The Hon. Don Toth, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan, serves as the honorary patron of the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program. He is also the chair of the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program Advisory Committee.

Mr. Ken Pontikes serves as the director of the Program and chair of the Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program Selection Committee. Mr. Pontikes has been appointed to the director position by the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly. This appointment is made from a joint recommendation of the University of Saskatchewan and the University of Regina and following a review by the SLIP Advisory Committee. Mr. Pontikes is serving in his second term as director, with the appointment continuing until October 31, 2011.

The Saskatchewan Legislative Internship Program does not directly employ any staff. Staff support is provided through the universities and the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan. The staff support for 2010 was provided by the following individuals:

SASKATCHEWAN LEGISLATIVE INTERNSHIP PROGRAM 2010 INTERNS

Sheena then returned to the University of Regina where she convocated in June 2008 with a Bachelor of Arts degree (High Honours in Geography). Notes to Financial Statements:

1. All cash for the Intern Development Fund and for the Rawlco Aboriginal Internship Fund are being held, on behalf of the program, by the University of Saskatchewan.
2. The interns organized a fund-raising event to provide supplementary financing for their comparative study tour. A barbecue for members of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan and other supporters of SLIP was held on April 26, 2010. The event generated a surplus of \$1,139.34 (revenues of \$1,470.00 less expenses of \$330.66) for the interns. These funds were used to finance entry to various cultural and sporting events occurring during their comparative study tour.
3. The Program received in-kind support from AREVA Resources Canada Limited, the Canadian Study of Parliament Group, the Saskatchewan Association of Health Organizations, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce, and the Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association. The value of this in-kind support is not included in the SLIP financial statements.
4. The interns who were registered students of the University of Regina were eligible to apply for travel grants from the University of Regina Students' Union and the Goldman Travel Fund. These amounts were directly granted to the interns. These grants were initially deposited into the Interns' Fund-raising Account and then transferred to the Intern Development Fund. All amounts from these grants were used to finance eligible comparative study travel expenses incurred by the University of Regina's interns through the Intern Development Fund.
5. The Rawlco Aboriginal Saskatchewan Legislative Internship concluded in 2009. Unutilized funding supplied by Rawlco Radio for this internship, totaling \$15,813.82, was repaid to the donor. Most of the unutilized funds occurred because the intern selected for 2009 did not complete her internship.
6. An account held by the Affinity Credit Union is used to manage the interns' fund-raising activities. At the end of the fiscal year, the account had a balance of \$54.35 which consisted of the account's \$5.00 membership fee and \$49.35 in cash available for use in a future year.
7. Intern selection expenses pertain to the travel, accommodation, and meal costs associated with interviewing candidates for the 2011 internship. These costs were incurred in 2009-10 by candidates and by members of the Program's selection committee.
