His previous employment includes work for Statistics Canada that provided insight into the concerns of Saskatchewan citizens, as well as research for a professor, market research company, and human resources work. Mr. Baker credits his education with developing his ability to think critically and communicate effectively. He looks forward to applying his understanding of world issues to provincial politics. He states, "The current Saskatchewan political scene is in a unique position . . . I believe my abilities as a writer, communicator and problem solver, complemented by my work ethic will enable me to serve my appointed MLA." Mr. Baker's involvement with community activities includes coaching the Regina Balfour Redmen football team offensive line.

MARIA KURYLO

Marian Kurylo is a recent graduate from the University of Saskatchewan where she obtained a Master of Arts in Political Studies, after completion of a BA – Double Honours in Political Studies and French. Her academic training focused on several topics including Canadian federal politics, public administration, international development, economic issues and the political aspects of language. Her MA thesis, Canada's Commissioner of Official Languages: The Unexplored Concept of the Officer of Parliament", considered the COL from the perspective of the machinery of government. She is fluent in French and has conversational ability in German, all enhanced by her travels and a variety of work experiences in Europe. She works as a census representative with Statistics Canada and served as the Assistant to the director of the Association Jeunesse Fransaskoise (AJF). WENDY MOELLENBECK
