Through her undergraduate studies, Marnie was fortunate to study the Ukrainian language in Lviv, Ukraine in May 2014. There, she became involved with Help Us Help The Children, a Toronto-based organization that holds summer and winter camps for orphaned and refugee children in Ukraine. Since 2014, Marnie has returned to Ukraine four more times to volunteer at these camps and at a rehabilitation workshop for families that have lost their husbands and fathers to the conflict in Eastern Ukraine. She also supports the organization back home in Saskatoon by doing presentations, hosting events, and collecting donations of clothing and other goods to send to the children.
