Some or all of us went to several other conferences including the Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association (SUMA) and the Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities (SARM) in Regina, and the Canadian Community Economic Development Network (CCEDnet) Conference, the Duty to Consult Roundtable discussions, and the Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations (FSIN) Winter Assembly in Saskatoon.

Our comparative study tour took us to Ottawa, London, England, and Belfast, the capital of Northern Ireland. It was interesting to learn that even though London, Ottawa, and Saskatchewan share the Westminster system, there are some differences that have implications for the political system. Belfast's government is entirely different from any other form of government. The concept of parties splitting up the control of government departments based on their share of seats is definitely something new. The trip was a life-changing experience for all of us, and we were surprised with how much we learned.

This year, the interns got involved with the Globe Theatre in Regina. We volunteered by handing out

programs and running the coat check for the performance of *Six Dance Lessons in Six Weeks*. We were lucky enough to see the show for free afterwards! We met with Andrew North, the General Manager of the Globe and we talked to him about the role of theatre in Regina and how the change in government, the economic boom, and the rise in fuel prices have affected the organization. It was a great experience for all of us and we each hope to be involved with the Globe in the future, either by attending performances or volunteering.

We hosted the second annual SLIP steak night at Bushwackers, which was a definite success. Many legislative staff, MLAs, SLIP alumni, family, and friends attended. We also hosted our wind-up at Crave Kitchen and Wine Bar. It was a great way to socialize and thank everyone for their overwhelming support of the internship program.

During our internship, we had the opportunity to meet and talk with several influential people. In addition to Mayor Jim Scarrow and Linda Nosbush and the many individuals on our trip (see "The 2008 SLIP Comparative Study Tour") we met Mayors Pat Fiacco and Don Atchinson, His Honour Dr. Gordon Barnhart, Pam Leyland and John Gormley of RAWLCO Radio, Vern Faulkner of the Prince Albert Daily Herald, the new provincial Green Party leader Amber Jones, and Ron Rucks from the union representing the Prince Albert pulp mill workers. Without the internship, we never would have been able to meet so many fantastic leaders in the province.

It seems like just yesterday when we started as interns, but it's over already! We had a great year as interns and we are well prepared for whatever the future might hold for us!

The 2008 SLIP Comparative Study Tour

Our comparative study trip was an amazing experience. For most of us, it was our first time visiting Europe. We were surprised with how much we learned and saw by the end of the trip. This year, the trip took us to Ottawa for four weekdays, London (England) for four weekdays and a weekend, and Belfast for three weekdays and a weekend.

Ottawa

Our first meeting in Ottawa was with the Chief Electoral Officer Mark Mayrand. Our meeting with him was supposed to be in the afternoon, but he called us to reschedule to have a morning meeting. What we realized later was that he was planning to raid the Conservative Party headquarters that afternoon, which was why he had to move the meeting! We didn't know this, of course, until we went to Question Period that afternoon.

Another highlight of the trip was meeting Kathleen Petty, the host of CBC Radio's "The House", Chief Political Correspondent Keith Boag, and Don Newman, host of "Politics with Don Newman". We asked them about their approaches to political journalism and discussed Saskatchewan Politics. We also got a tour of the CBC facility.

We met with many notable public figures such as Jack Layton, Saskatchewan MPs Ralph Goodale and Carol Skelton, Indian and Northern Affairs Minister Chuck Strahl, Supreme Court Justice Marshall Rothstein, Senator Jim Munson, key parliamentary staff, and officials from the UK and US embassies.

London

London was a very fascinating place for all of us. There was so much to see, do, and learn that it was almost overwhelming. The most notable part of the trip was spending a day at the Palace of Westminster. We got a tour of this amazing building and had lunch with two of the clerks in the Stranger's dining room. It was one of the nicest meals many of us have ever had. We were able to meet with committee clerks from both the House of Commons and the House of Lords. It was interesting to watch Question Time as well, which differed significantly from what we were used to in Saskatchewan and Ottawa.

After hearing so much about the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association from Monique Lovatt, it was great to spend part of a day at the CPA secretariat office. We discussed the CPA with Shem Baldeosingh and Nicholas Bouchet and joined them

and their co-workers for lunch. The CPA staff were the friendliest group we met on our trip.

In London we also visited Canada House in Trafalgar Square. We were given a full tour of the House, and we talked about UK-Canada relations with one of the senior members of the foreign service.

In addition, we met with officials at the Foreign Commonwealth Office, the Department of Justice, and the Department for Environment, Food, and Rural Affairs. We met MP Josh Grogan of the Labour Party, and Christian Moon of the Liberal Democrats, who was in charge of the party's policy projects team.

Belfast

Belfast was a friendly and relaxing place to visit after busy London. Northern Ireland was very beautiful (the grass is actually greener there) and our experience was very memorable.

We spent the majority of our time at Stormont Estate, home of the Northern Ireland Assembly. Our first meeting was with Christine Darrah and Martin Wilson, the Bill Clerk, who explained the procedures and committees of the assembly. We met with Kate

McCullough afterwards who gave us a presentation about the assembly.

We also met with the Chief Electoral Officer, who explained the progress Northern Ireland has made to having stable elections. We met officials from the Department of Regional Development and the Office of the First Minister and Deputy First Minister. We had an interesting time talking with Dawn Purvis, the only assembly member of the Progressive Unionist Party. It was enlightening to hear her perspective of women in Northern Ireland politics.

Although our trip was about two and a half weeks, it didn't seem long enough and before we knew it, we were back in Saskatchewan. We all wish we could go back to Ottawa and the UK some day. We were very privileged to go on such a great study trip and we can't wait to hear where the 2009 interns will go!

After completing SLIP, I began my first semester of law school at Queen's University in the fall of 2007. Going to university in a smaller town like

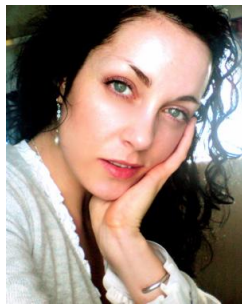

For May and June of 2008 I attended the International Study Center at Herstmonceux Castle in East Sussex, England. Essentially, Queen's owns a Castle in the English countryside where it is possible to take undergraduate and law school courses. While at the Castle I studied International Public Law, International Criminal Law, and International

Human Rights Law. A highlight of the experience was the professors, which included two International War Crimes Prosecutors for our International Criminal Law course.

After finishing my studies at the Castle I was able to travel around Croatia for a week before returning to Saskatchewan to spend the rest of the summer working for my father at his law firm in Melfort.

In starting, let me say that I remain incredibly grateful for the education that SLIP provided me early in my career. The dedication of those involved in organizing the program remains a model to me of what can be achieved through hard work and commitment to a vision – a special thank you in this regard is due to those in the Office of the Clerk (in my year Monique, Gwenn and the entire staff) and those at the Universities (the Director in 2005 was Ken Pontikes.) A very special thank you is also due to my MLA mentors through the process, Ted Merriman and Sandra Morin. I enjoyed very different experiences with both members, but both inspired me with their dedication to public life and demonstrated great strength through adversity. On a weekly basis I realize the richness of their rather unintentional at times teachings.

Immediately following the 2005 SLIP program, I traveled to Japan as part of a small Canadian delegation and along with delegations from 12 other countries, I participated in a series of meetings, events and conferences organized by the Japanese Cabinet Office. My time in Japan was spent exploring themes such as corporate

social contribution, the environment, development politics and international cooperation.

I returned to Saskatchewan to continue my education in political science, and began a MA in political science at the University of Regina. I was excited to be able to continue studies of Aboriginal-state relations and decolonization with Dr. Green. At this time I also began working with the Saskatchewan Institute of Public Policy and worked on contract with the University of the Arctic.

Through my undergraduate and graduate studies, and with the exposure SLIP provided to public policy in practice, I was increasingly convinced that the professional public service was the place that I could pursue the change I wanted to see in Saskatchewan and in our country. In fall 2006 I jumped at the opportunity to work with Saskatchewan's most senior public servant, the Deputy Minister to the Premier, Dan Perrins, through the Graduate School of Public Policy's internship program.

In spring of 2007, I made the difficult decision to leave Saskatchewan and moved to Vancouver. I had benefited from some incredible mentoring during my time with executive council in Regina and I was hooked on the public service. In the summer of 2007 I joined the British Columbia public service.

During my first six months with the BC government I wore two hats, working as both Special Advisor with the Deputy Ministers' Policy Secretariat in the Office of the Premier and as Initiatives Manager with the Cross Government Research Policy and Practice Branch (CGRPP) in the Office of the Chief Information Officer.

Early in 2008 I took on a new position as Director for Policy and Information Dissemination with CGRPP. I remain in this position and have offices in both Victoria and Vancouver, dividing my time as necessary between both cities.

While I miss Saskatchewan's four seasons, the Roughriders, short commutes, and the incredible network of friends, colleagues and family that I left behind, moving west did mean a return to

my childhood roots and I am in awe of the beauty of my western home every day – whether I'm enjoying the daily walks with my dog along the seawall or sailing into the Victoria harbour on the seaplane. While at the University of Regina, he volunteered as a board member of the University of Regina Students' Union, and the GBLUR Centre for Sexuality and Gender Diversity. Patrick also tutored several students in economics, math, and statistics.

As an intern, Patrick was mainly responsible for liaising with SLIP Alumni, organizing the wind-up celebration, and planning the community service component at the Globe Theatre. He started the internship with Greg Ottenbreit (Yorkton) from the government caucus where he researched community-based organizations in Saskatchewan. After the comparative study trip, he switched to Cam Broten (Saskatoon Massey Place) and helped write member's statements and several informational papers on public policy topics. Patrick's research paper for the program focused on Saskatchewan's public debt. It examined the many costs of public debt and evaluated strategies to finance debt reduction.

When Patrick is not working or studying, he enjoys watching the news, particularly political shows such as "Politics with Don Newman" on CBC. He loves watching documentaries and spends far too much time on Facebook. He is currently working on several visual art projects and is finally going to the gym on a consistent basis.

Patrick accepted an offer to attend the University of Toronto for graduate study starting in mid-August 2008. He will be completing a Master of
